

The Weekly Update Fredericksburg Presbyterian Church Apríl 16, 2025

Exactly two hundred years ago, in1825, the Scottish-born poet and hymn writer published the common version of his hymn: "Go to Dark Gethsemane". (We talked about this hymn a few weeks ago in Sunday worship.) Each of the four stanzas of the hymn describe a different scene from the final hours of that first holy week – the garden, the trial, the cross and the tomb. Here is the text of that centuries old song:


Go to dark Gethsemane, You who feel the tempter's pow'r; Your Redeemer's conflict see; Watch with Him one bitter hour; Turn not from His griefs away; Learn of Jesus Christ to pray.

See Him at the judgment hall, beaten, bound, reviled, arraigned O the worm-wood and the gall! O the pangs His soul sustained! Shun not suff'ring, shame, or loss; Learn of Christ to bear the cross. Calv'ry's mournful mountain climb There' adoring at His feet, Mark that miracle of time, God's own sacrifice complete: "It is finished!" Hear Him cry; Learn of Jesus Christ to die.

Early hasten to the tomb Where they laid his breathless clay; All is solitude and gloom; Who has taken Him away? Christ is ris'n! He meets our eyes: Savior, teach us so to rise.

For each of these scenes, Mongomery wants us to consider a lesson we might learn from Christ. The final scene - of the Easter-morning empty tomb - ends with a request: for Jesus to teach us to rise with Him.

But Jesus does more than teach us to rise. Jesus raises us to new life HIMSELF. This is something James Montgomery understood. Montgomery's parents were missionaries, and when he was a young man away at boarding school, they died on the mission field in Barbados. They had given their lives in taking the good news of Jesus to the West Indies. For Montgomery, the truth of Jesus' resurrection wasn't an abstract concept; the truth of Jesus' resurrection was what sustained him and gave him hope in the darkest moments of his life.



This week we will remember again the events of Jesus' death and His resurrection. We will tell the stories and sing the songs, and we will gather at the cemetery and in the sanctuary to proclaim again the truth that Christ has died, Christ is risen and Christ will come again.

But Easter is about more than songs and stories – Easter recounts true events that demonstrate the love, sacrifice and hope of the risen Jesus! The Easter truths usually matter most on days other than Easter. Days like when Montgomery learned of the loss of his parents – days that come to each of us, when we experience the sharp edges of grief and loss. The empty tomb is the promise that we hold onto when things are at their hardest; when death seems to be the enemy that steals and destroys.

On Easter we celebrate the things we need to remember most on those other terrible days: that Jesus' resurrection brings with it the promise of our own resurrection. Because He is risen and lives, those who belong to Him will rise and live as well.

This is the best news ever! The was not the end of Jesus' story, and it need not be the end of our story either! We are surrounded by people who need to hear the news of the empty tomb and the hope of resurrection – who can you tell that news to this week?
